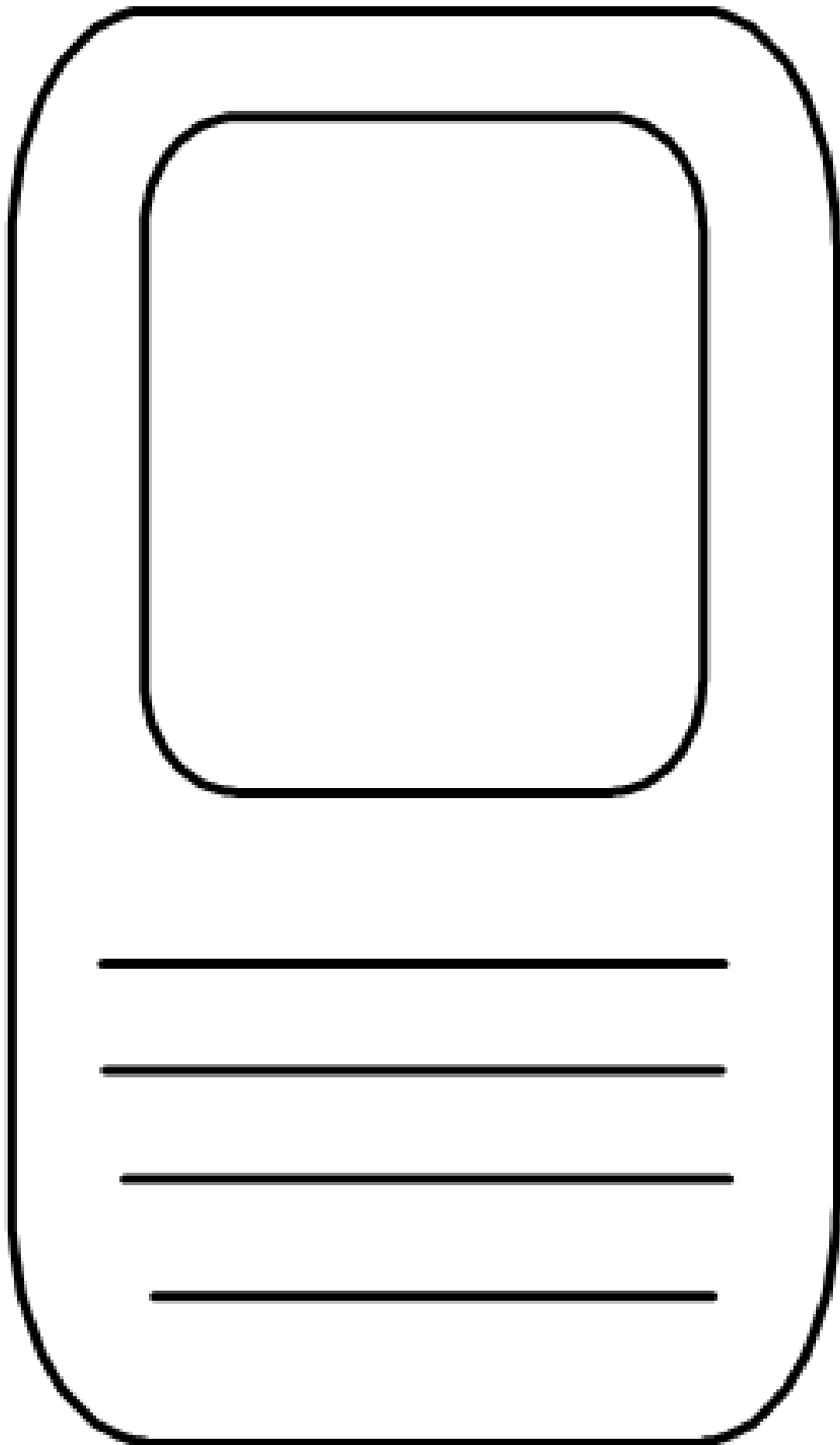

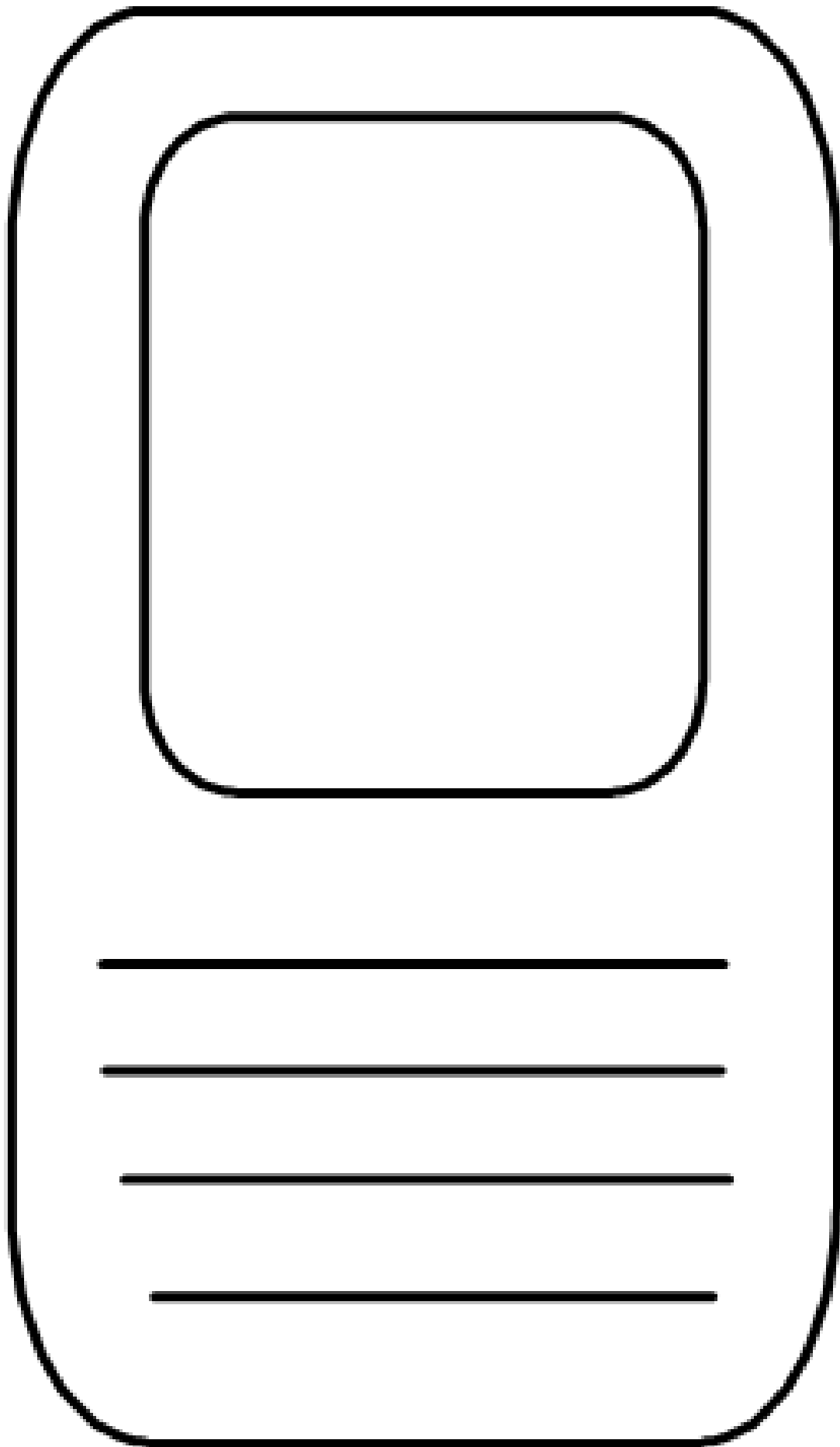
Listening to fluent reading helps improve vocabulary, builds stamina, and will make you a better reader!

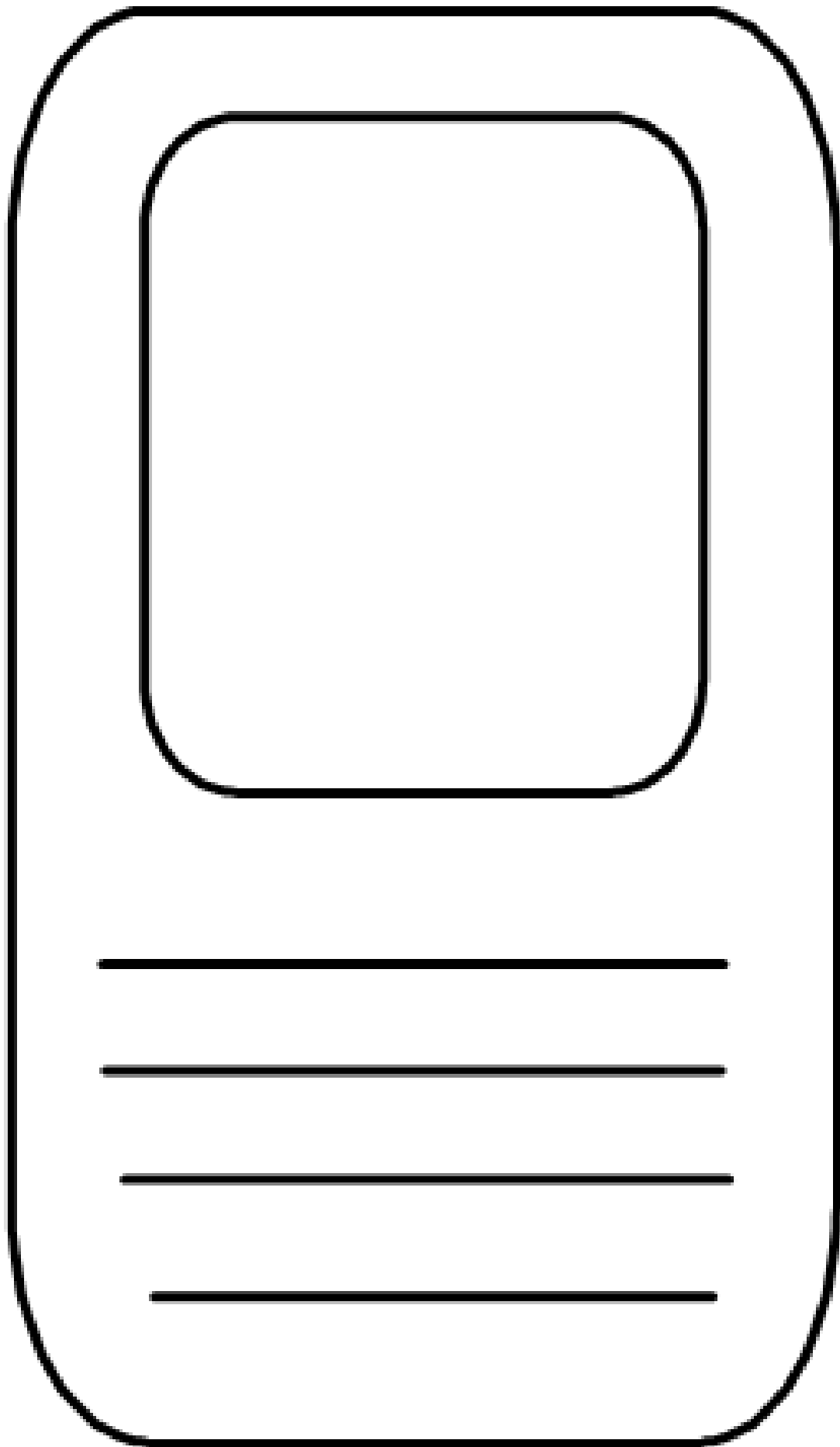


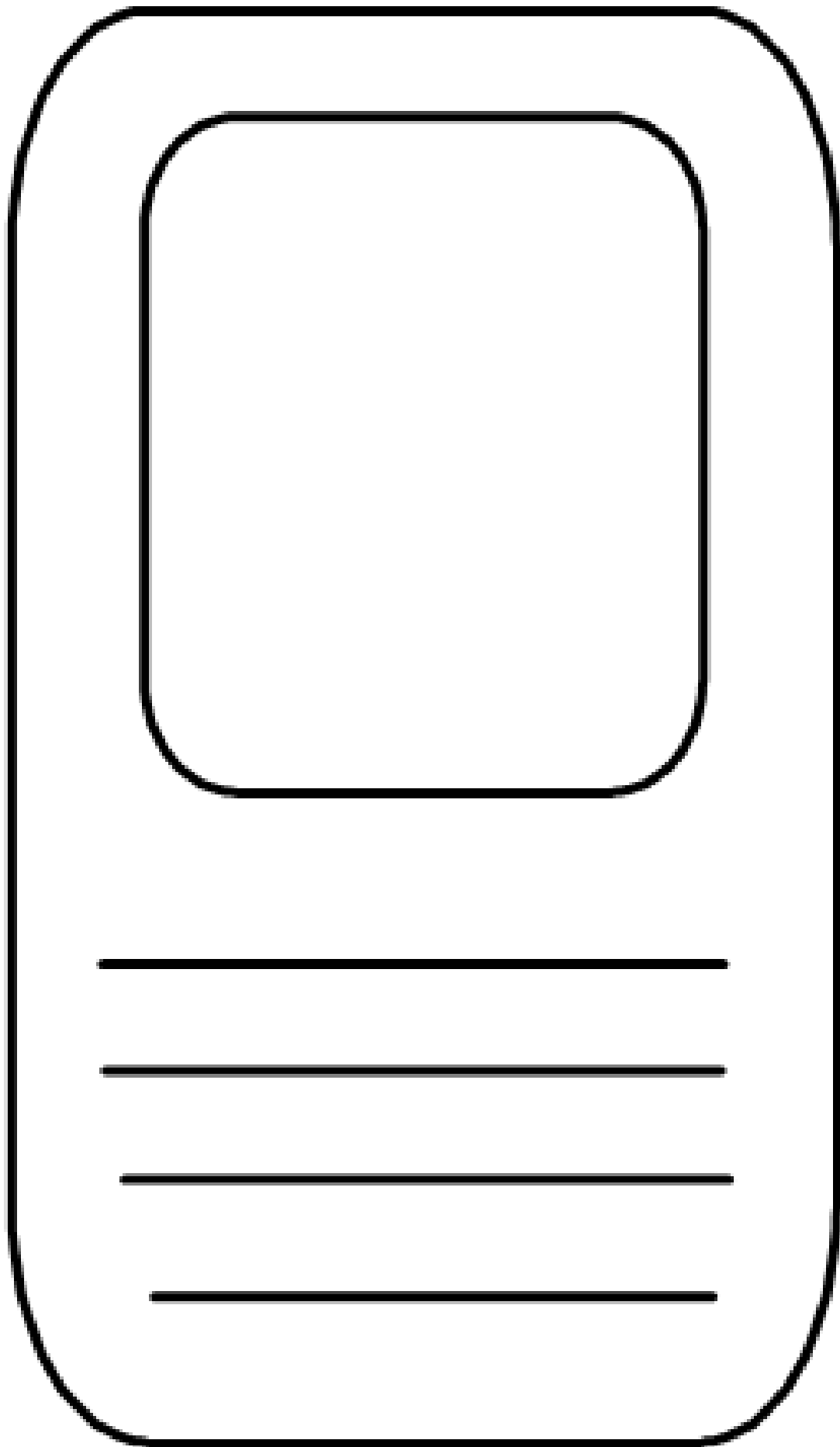
Ideas for responding to Listening to Reading	
	Find words in the text that follow <u>current rules</u> and mark them.
	<u>Tune into interesting words</u> and define and illustrate them.
	Write about my <u>favorite part</u> and illustrate it.
	Write about the <u>characters</u> and illustrate them.
	<u>Sequence</u> the events from the story. Tell about the beginning, middle, and end.
	<u>Text to self</u> . Tell how the story reminds you of something about yourself.
	Find the <u>main idea</u> and <u>details</u> and report about them.
	<u>Persuade</u> someone to listen to the story. Tell someone why you liked the story.

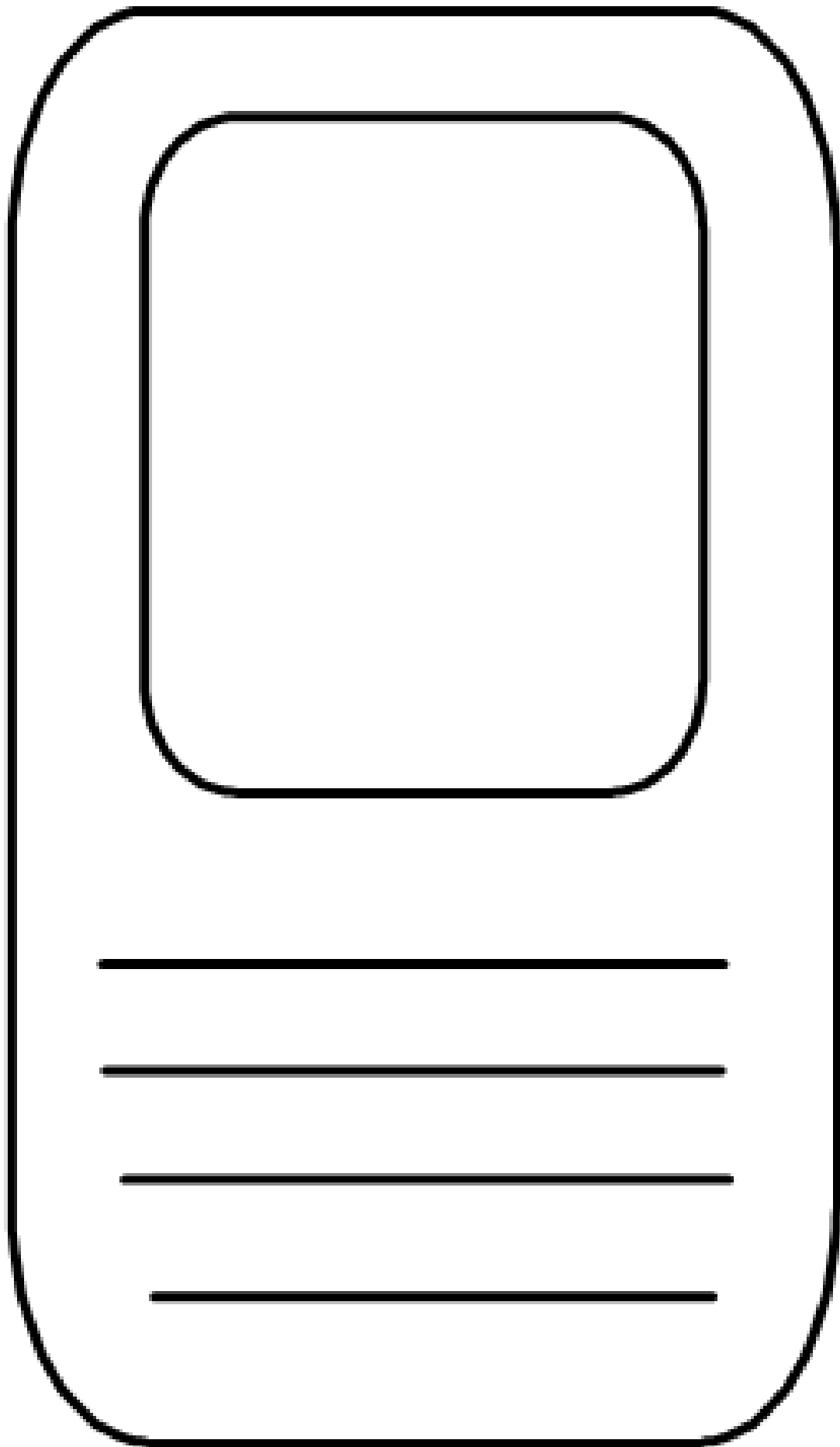


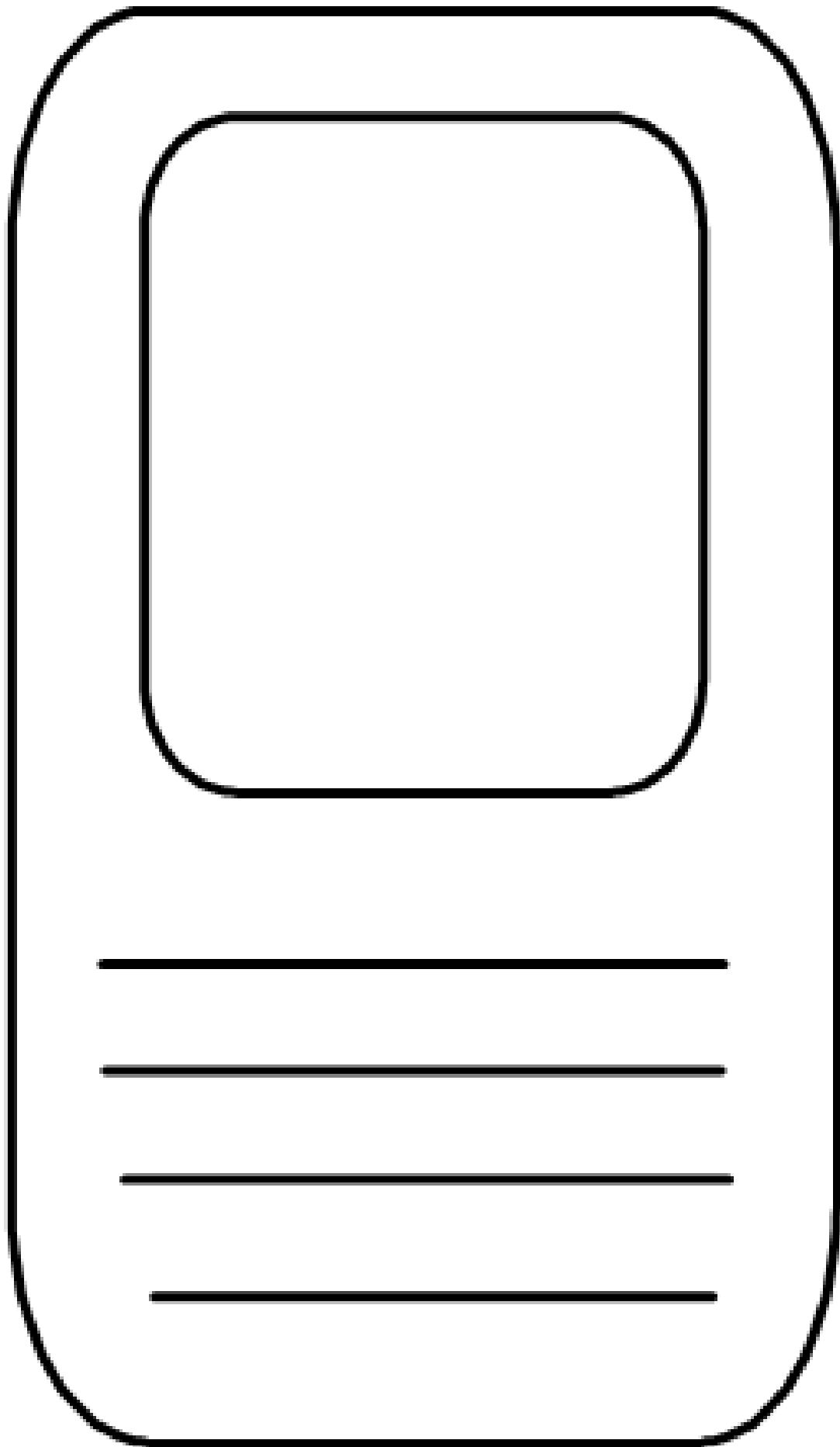


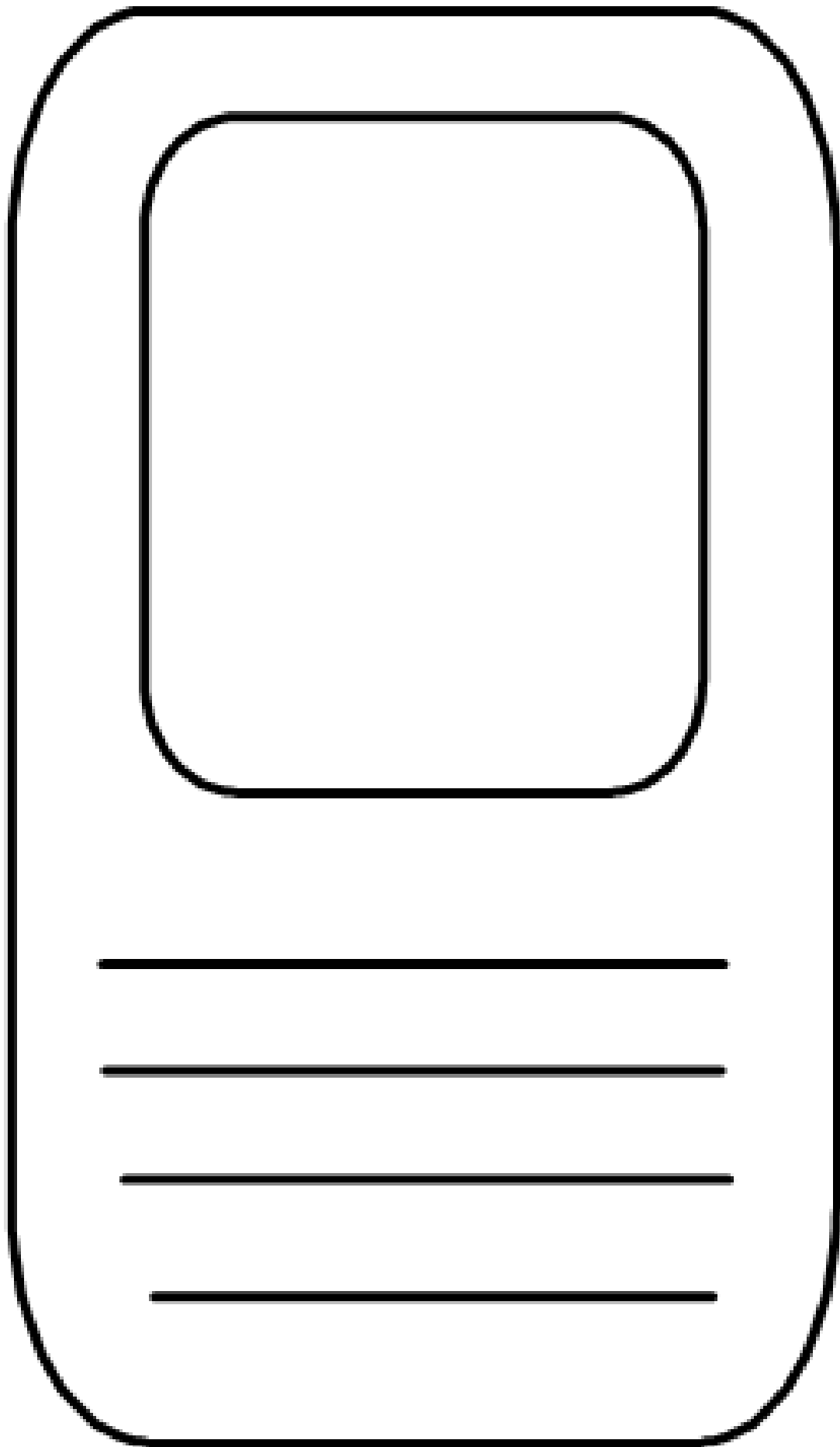


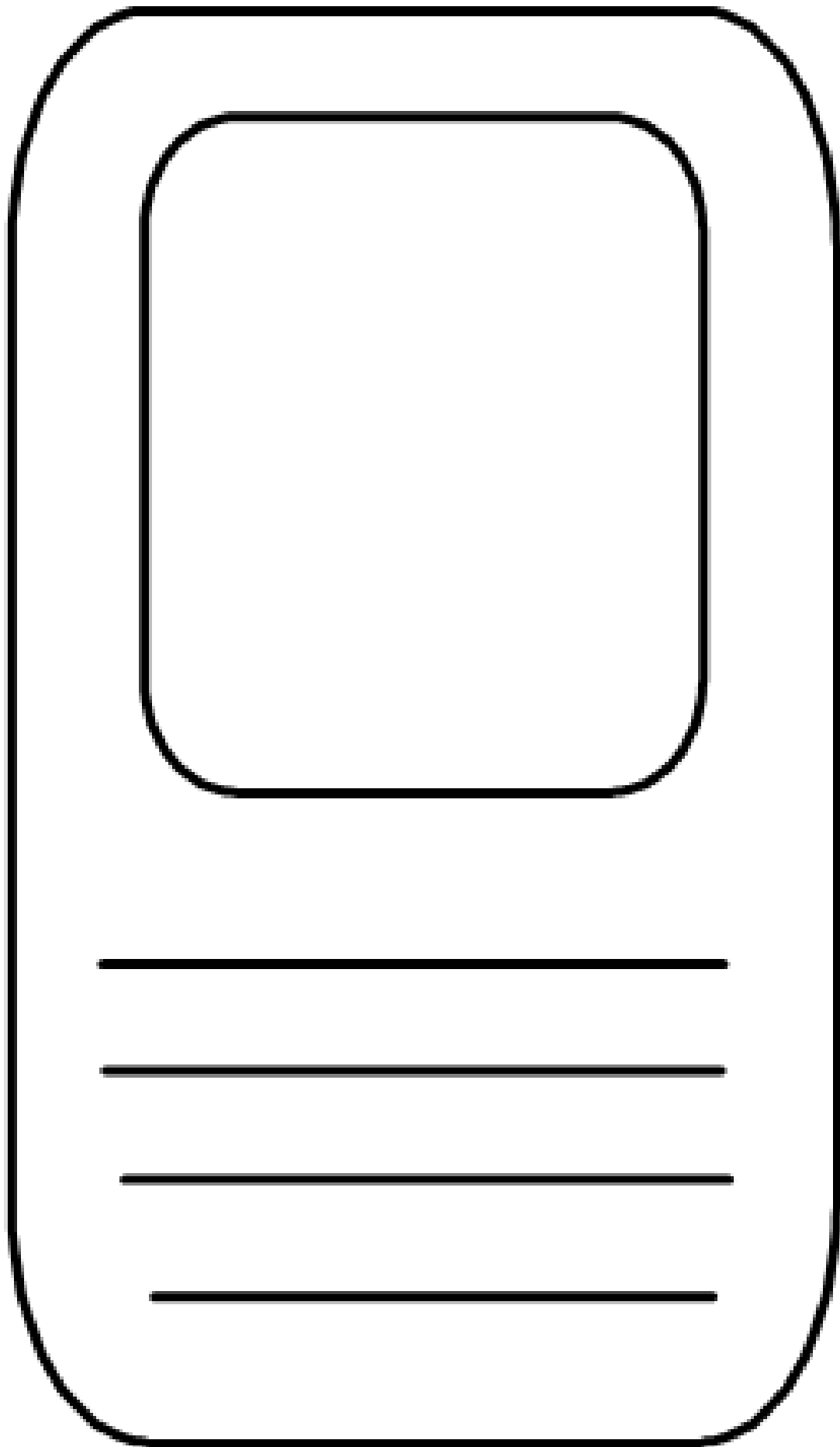


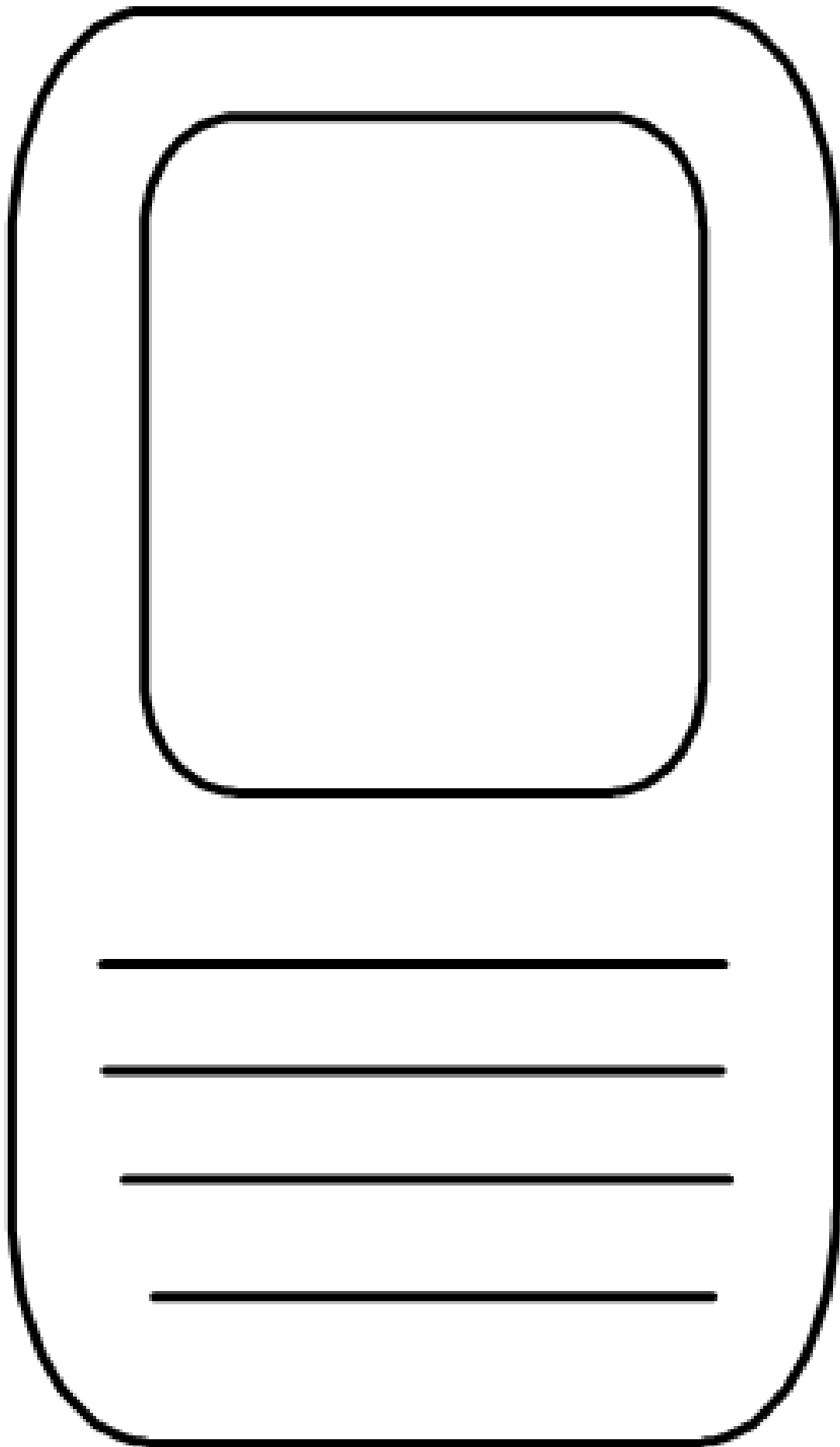


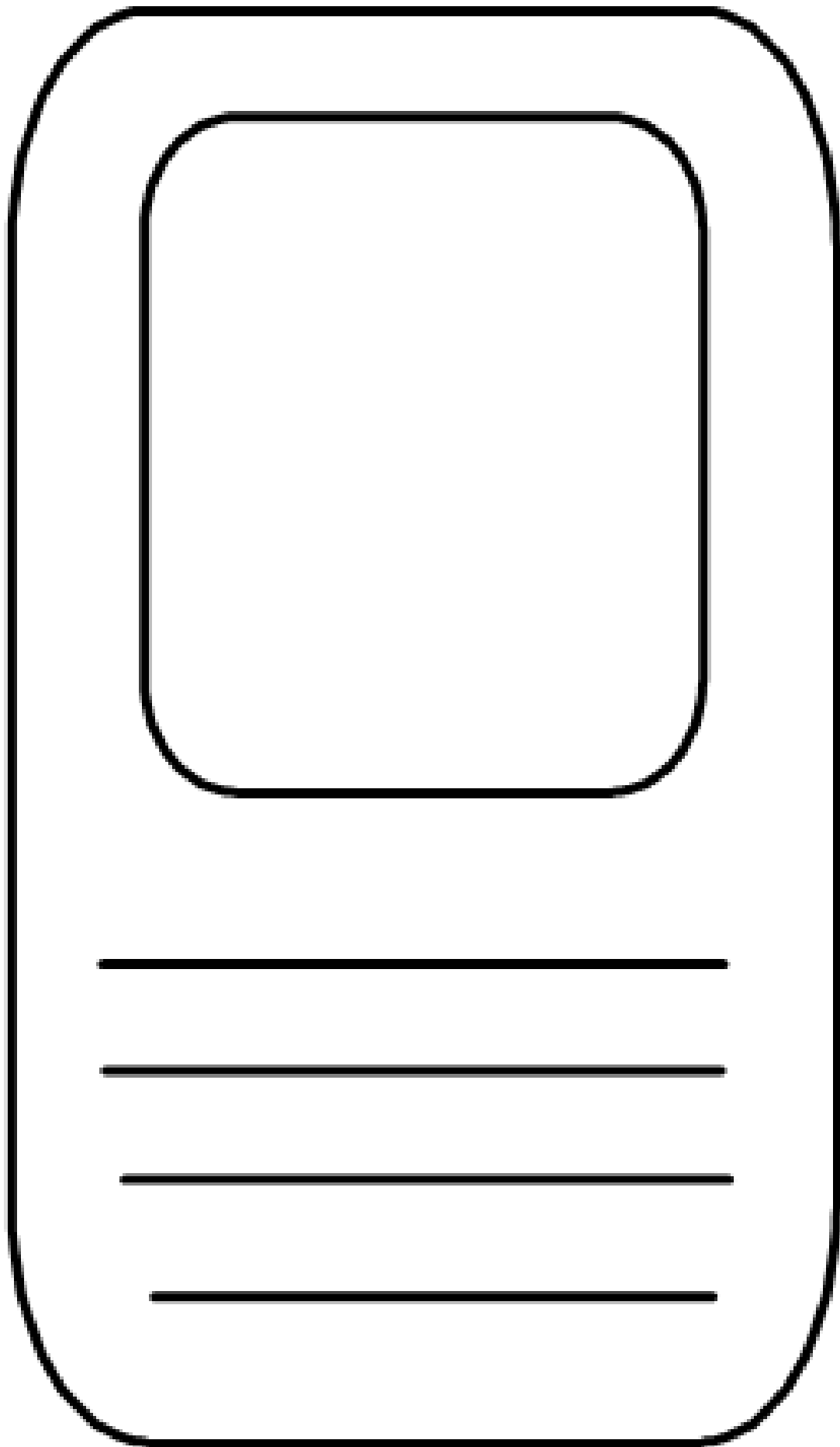


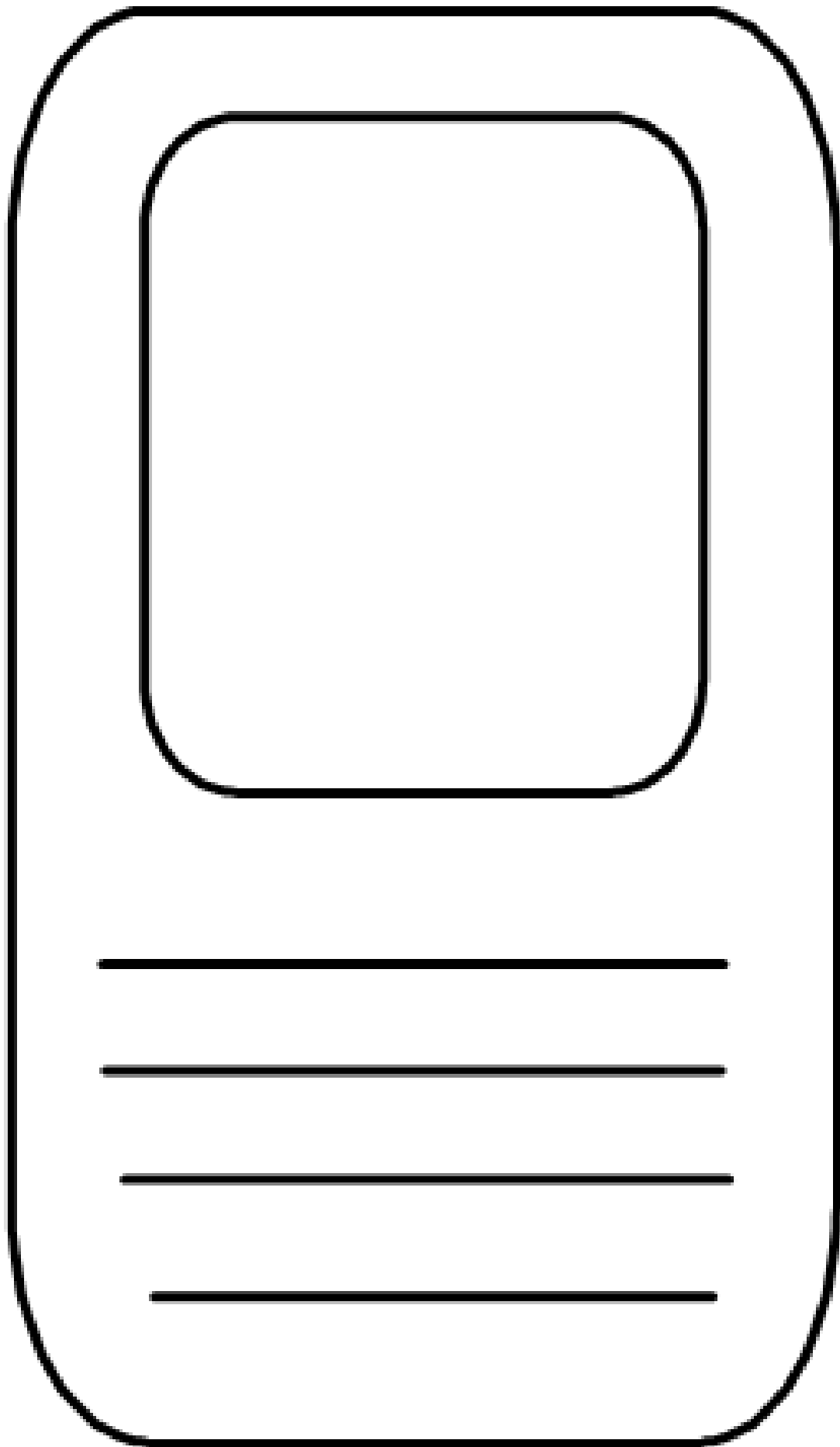


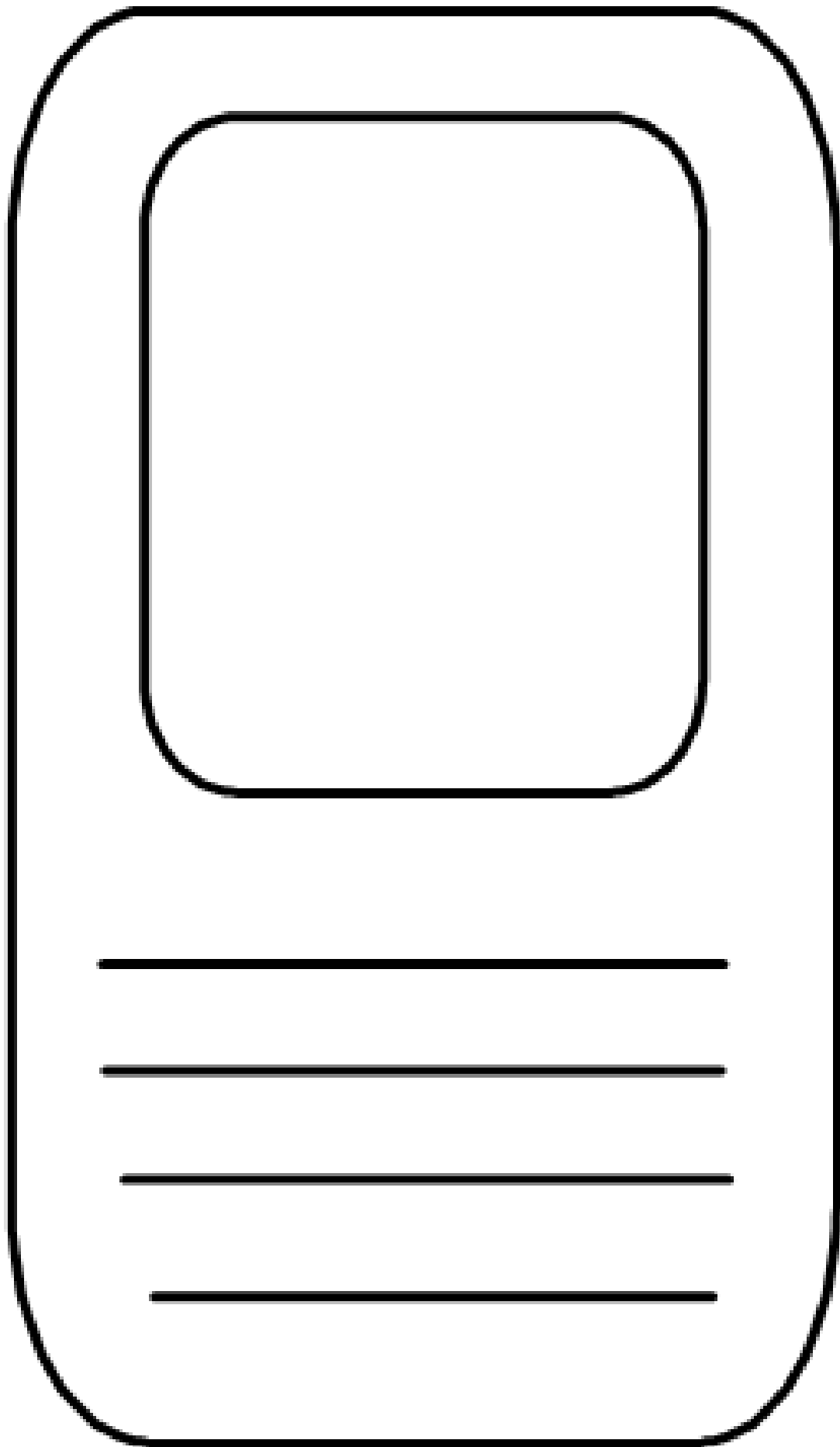


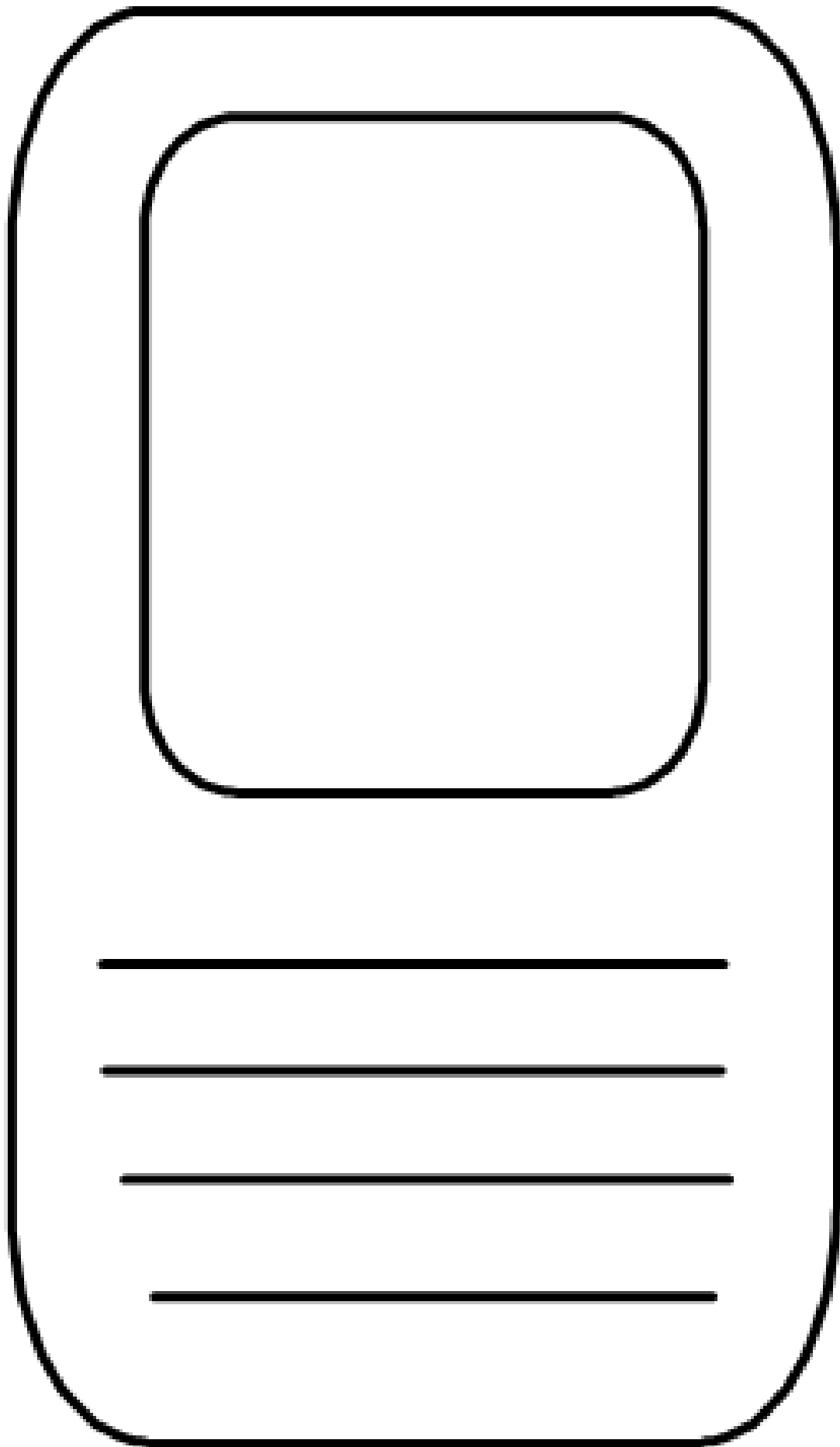


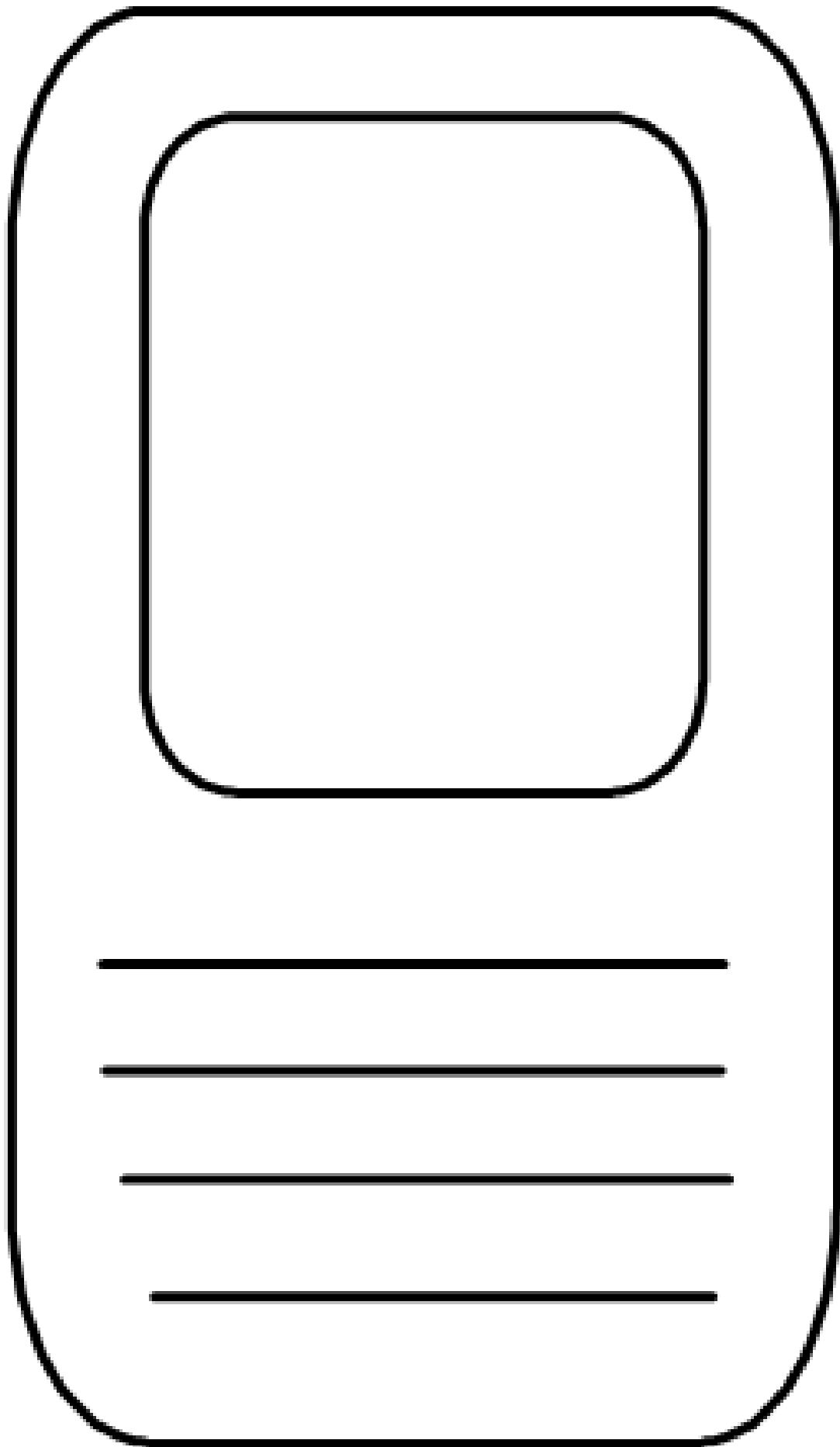


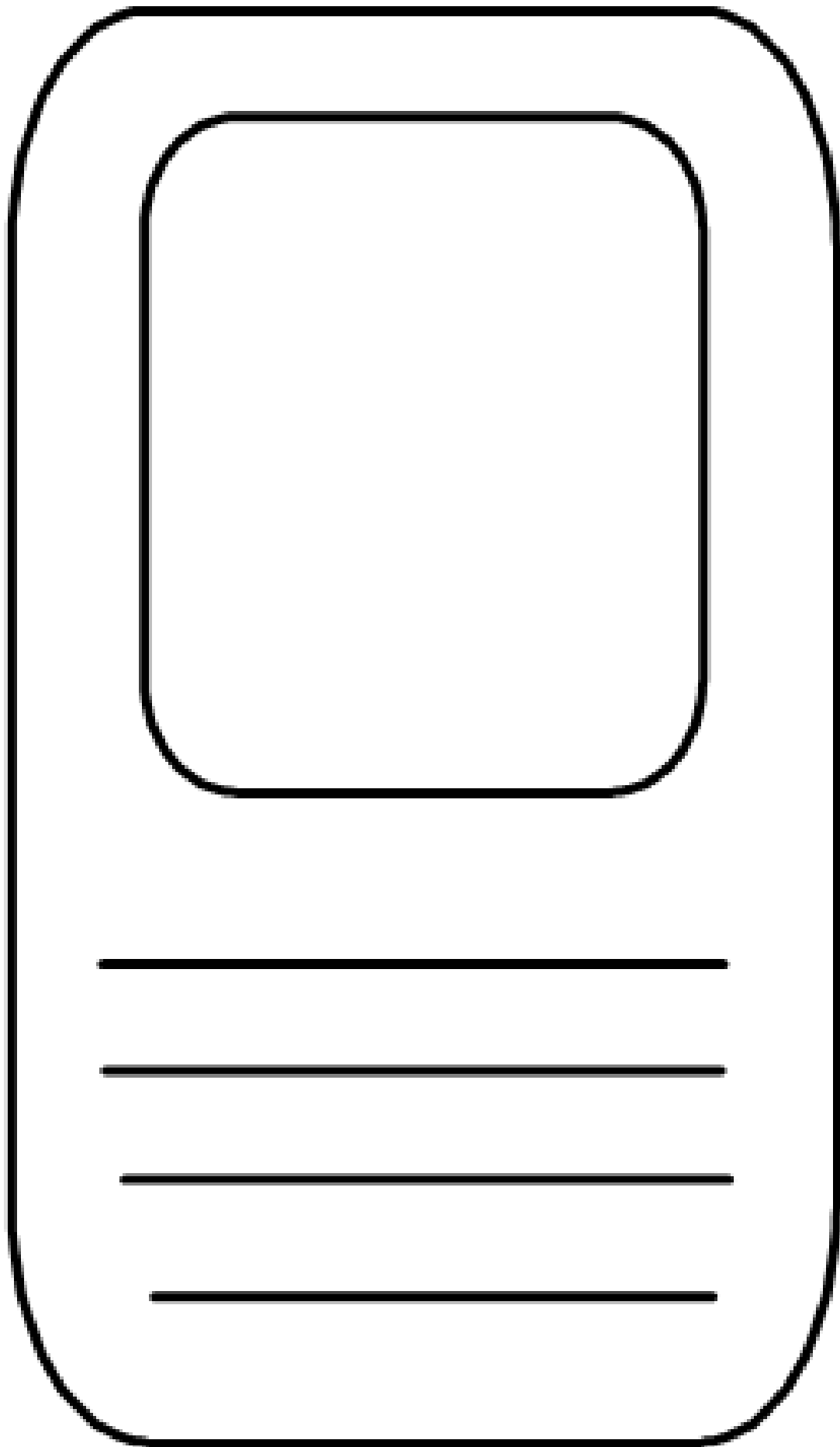


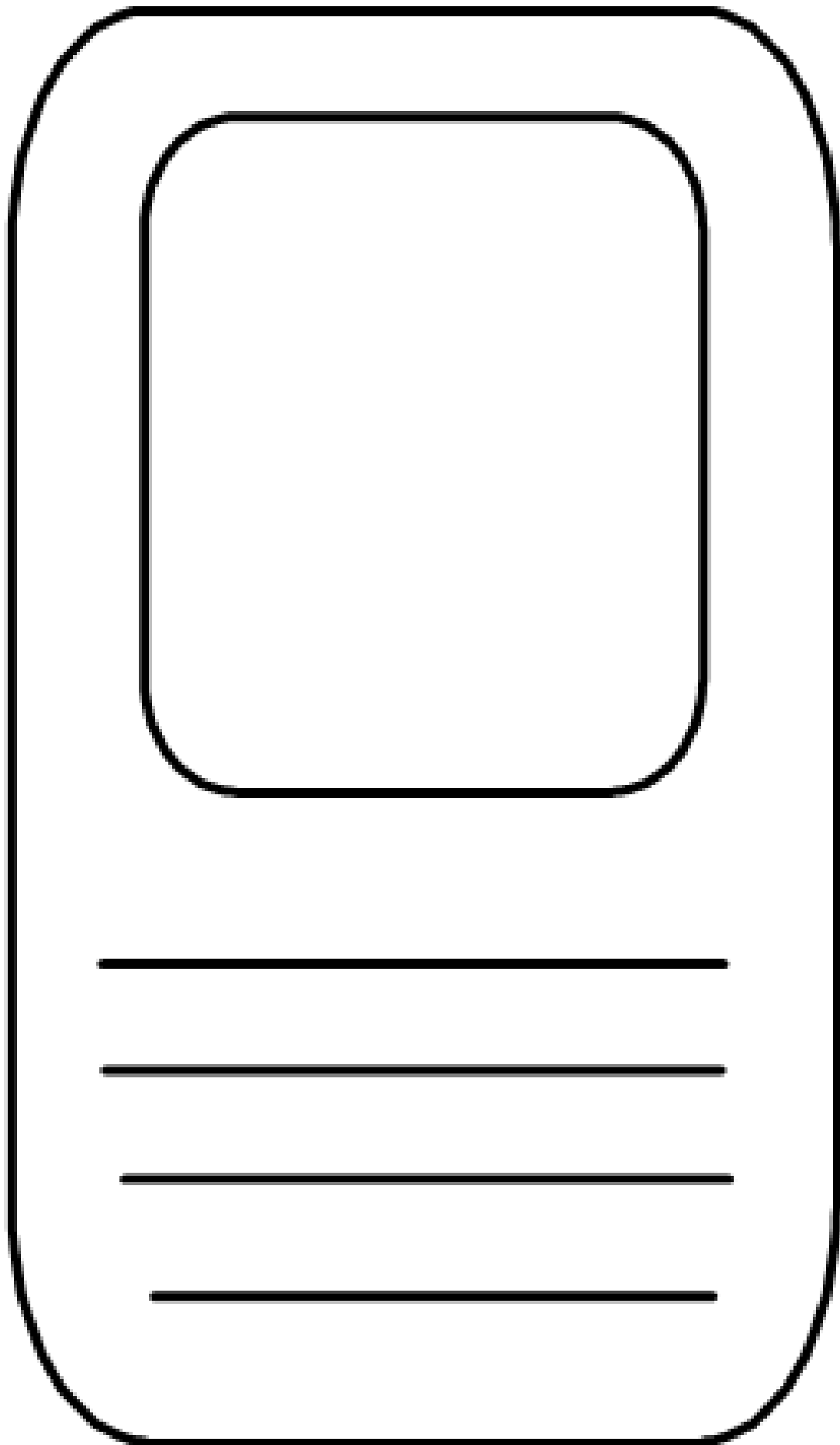


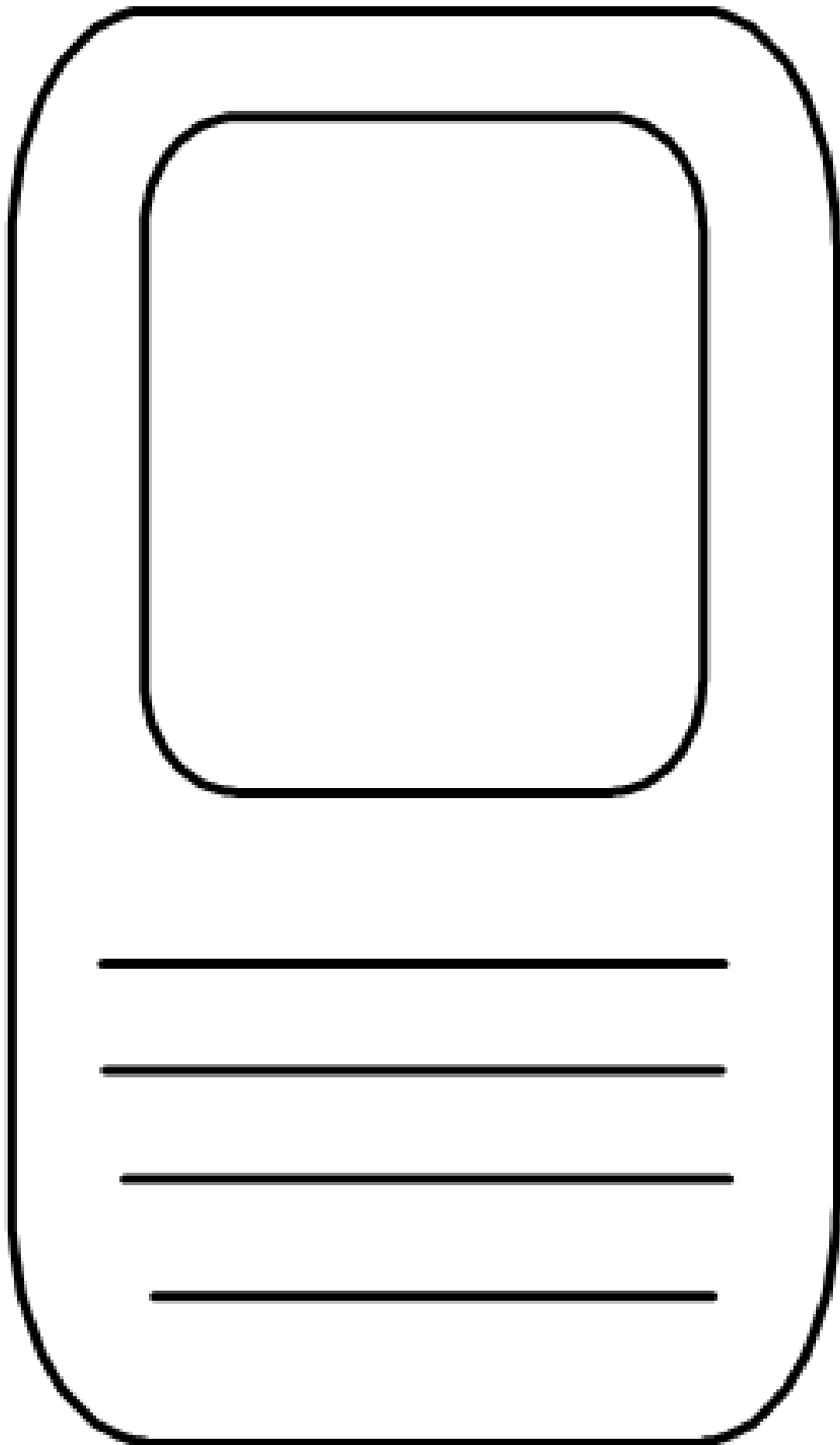


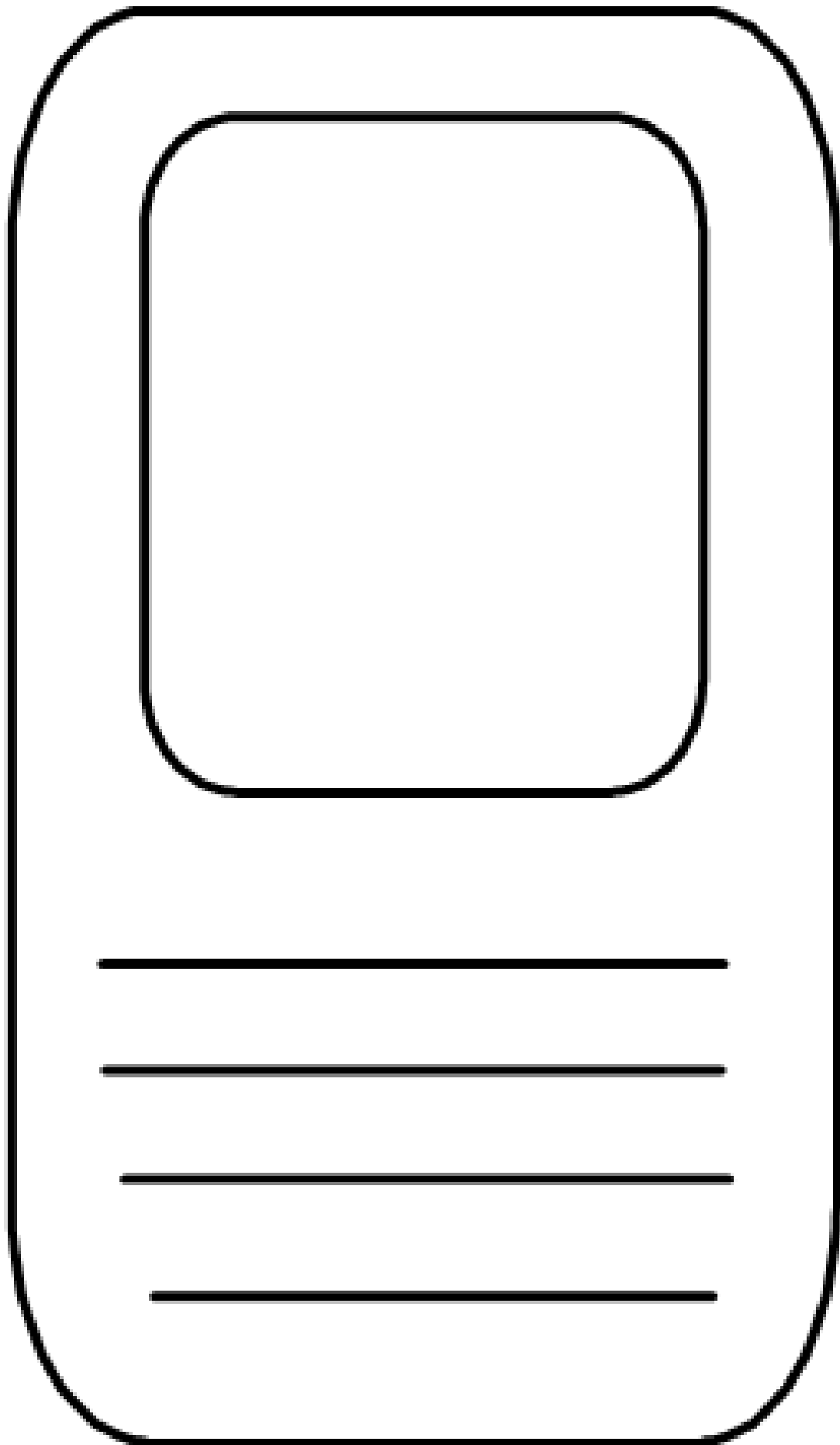


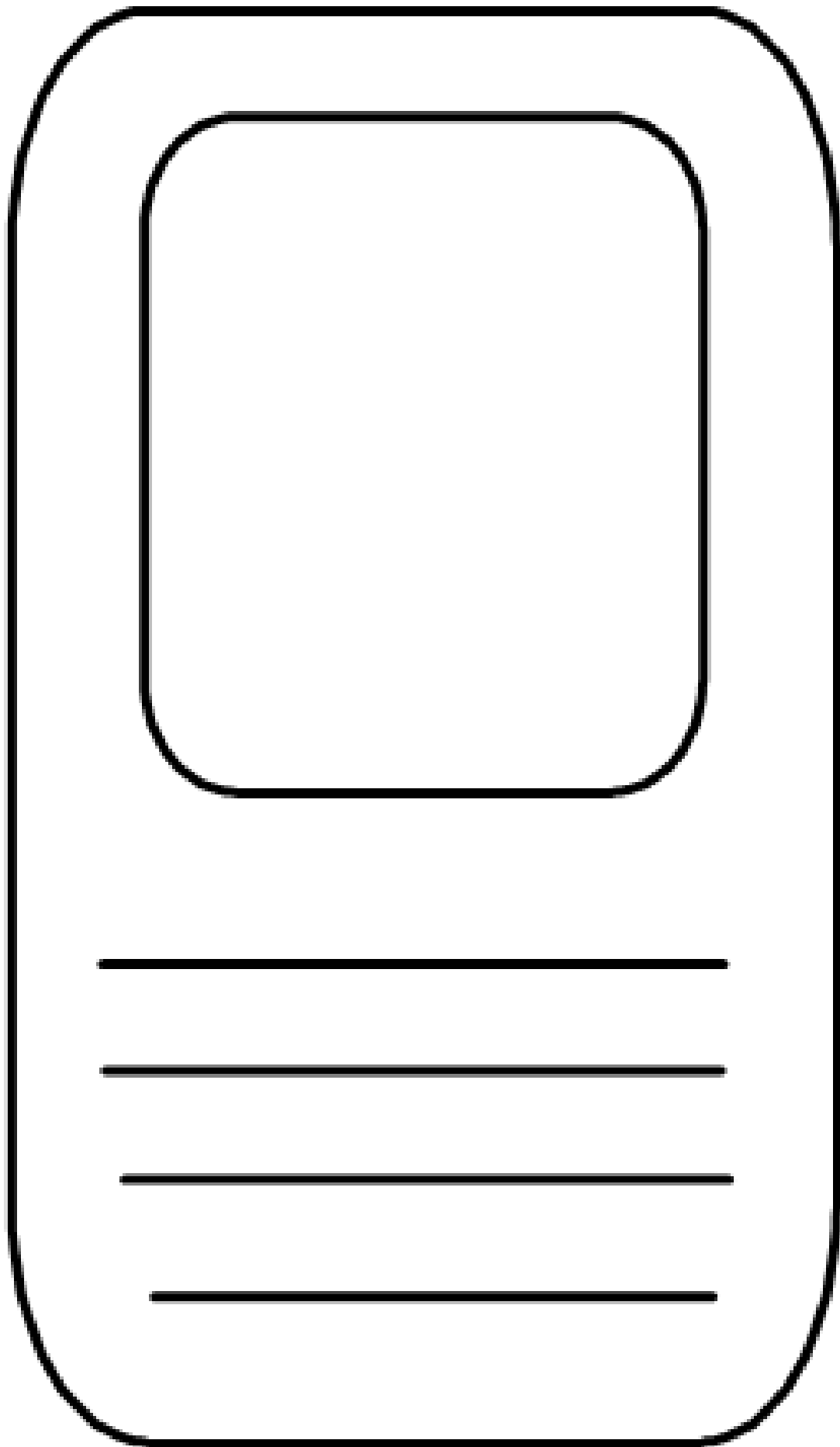


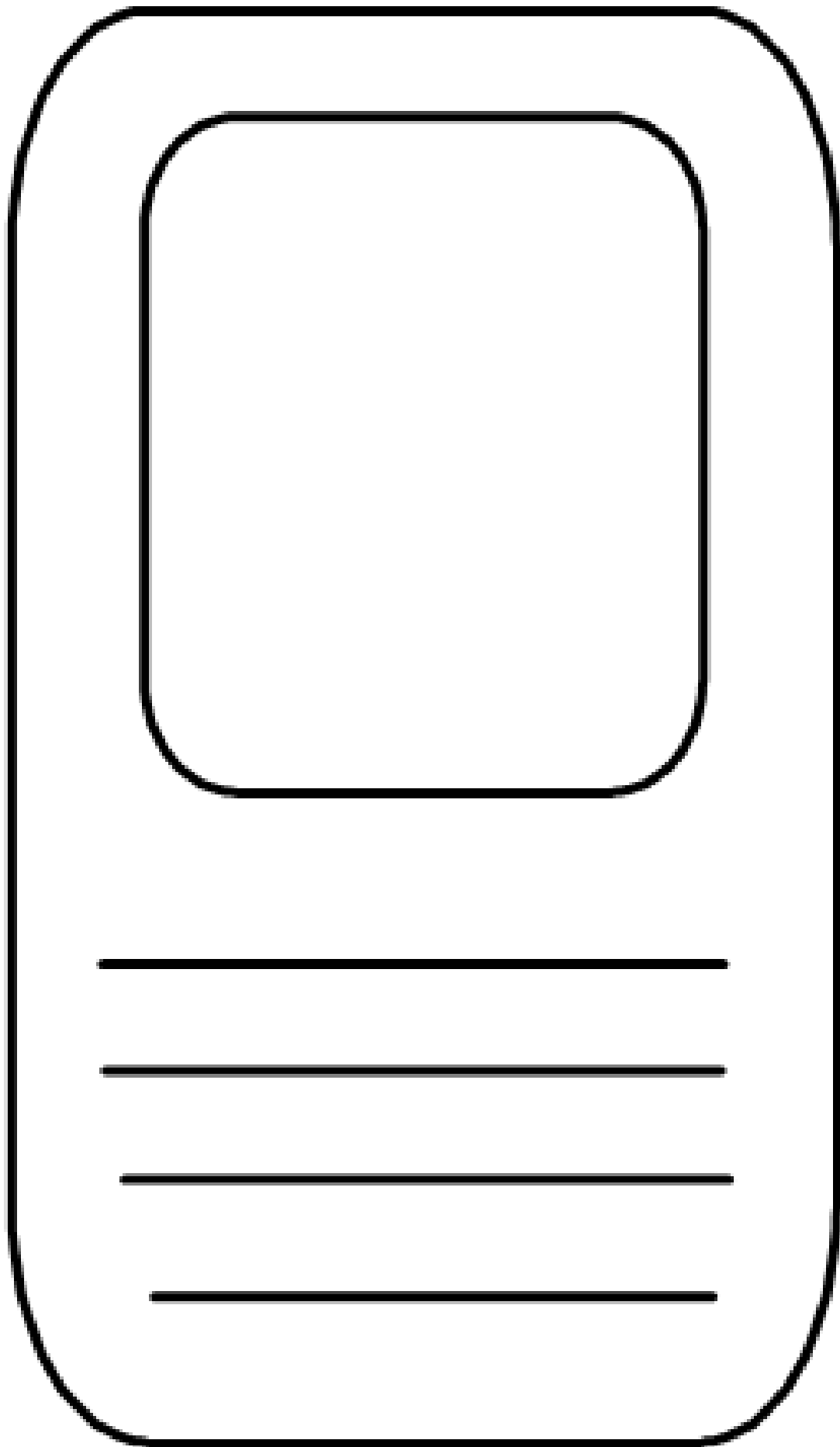














My Listening Checklist
