At the beginning of the school year, each class period will join their class period Google Classroom page. It is used for various reasons that include video links that reference class videos, notes, worksheets, practice links and sometimes locations to turn in work electronically.

Please note that the most recent post on classroom is displayed at the top. Therefore, if your child is looking for a post from previous weeks, you will need to scroll down to locate it.

Google calendar is where you can reference homework or classroom reminders. We will add calendar to automatically be synced with each students' chromebook calendar the first week of school. Ask them to show you their Google calendar and each class should be represented on the calendar. Don't see anything? Make sure the box is highlighted on the calendar, if its white the calendar is hidden/turned off.

WHAT WILL WE BE LEARNING THIS YEAR?

In 6th Grade ELA, we focus class instruction on the Reading/Writing Workshop model. After a few weeks of establishing class expectations and work environment, students will continue to use the Daily 5 routine from 5th grade daily to complete reading and/or writing work.

In middle school, we use Daily 3: Read to Self, Work on Writing and Word Work. Workshop lessons and work will be used during the Daily 3 class time. Our Word Work component will be Academic Vocab plus Words to Go activities. Please see the Unit 1 list as it's sent home after Labor Day weekend. Each unit will span two weeks with a test at the end of each unit.

Reading and Writing Workshop units will span a 5-6 week time per unit period. However, even though we are in a reading unit, students will still be reading and vice versa during writing units. Reading and Writing Workshop allows the classroom teacher to provide whole/small group as well as individualized instruction by differentiating and gearing instruction upon the students' needs. In reading, students will focus on both fiction and non-fiction reading selections, articles, short-stories and novels. Our reading units will transition into more complex reading sections which focus on story elements, analyzing themes, focus on how to read non-fiction in order to make valid arguments. While in writing students will create writing pieces in several genres: narrative, argument and informational writing. Small graded check points will be throughout each unit after large/small group instruction and guided practice. At the end of each unit, students complete a graded reading/writing assignment.

Referring to your child's binder or 3 subject notebook throughout the year will help you see the hard work they complete in class. Students can also share work sample at conference time as well.
